On Tuesday, 6 September 2011 – the first day of the 2011-2012 academic year -- the City of Philadelphia will, along with approximately 738 cities throughout the United States, participate in the National 2011 Million Father March. National 2011 Million Father March in the City of Philadelphia to assemble at

> Universal Vare Middle School 24th and Snyder Avenue by 7:00 A.M. on Tuesday, 6 September 2011

At 7:00 A.M. on Tuesday, 6 September 2011, adults and children will embark upon a walking route which will begin at Universal Vare Middle School at 24th and Snyder Avenue and proceed west on Snyder Avenue to 28th Street, north on 28th Street to Tasker Street, and west from 28th and Tasker Streets to 32nd and Tasker Streets to the Universal Audenreid Charter High School. Adults and children participating in the March are also being asked to use the center of the streets that have been identified as being a part of the walking route.

"We are asking every Father throughout the City of Philadelphia to escort their child to school on Tuesday, 6 September 2011, the first day of the 2011-2012 academic year. Center in the Park helps with memory loss study

Ever walk into a room to find something you just put down and ask yourself, "Where did I put that?" While that alone is not a sign of memory loss problems, more frequent issues with recall may be a sign of problems to come.

<u>Center in the Park</u>, located in Germantown's Vernon Park, is collaborating on outreach and recruitment for a community-based research program, <u>Hold That Thought</u>, is a survey being conducted <u>through the end of August</u>, by the Jefferson Medical College of Thomas Jefferson University and funded by the National Institute of Health. A ten-dollar Rite-aid gift card will be awarded for your participation.

The study will compare two programs (behavioral activation and talk therapy) to prevent memory loss in people who are already having mild memory problems. Participants should be having trouble with memory, be African American and at least 65 years old, and have a family member, caregiver or friend who will be their study partner. Each person enrolling receives a gift of \$20, and \$20 per visit.

Center in the Park has a track record of participation in communitybased research projects, most recently, having conducted Beat the Blues, a community-based depression intervention study.

Lynn Fields Harris, CIP Executive Director, said that "In the past, African Americans have been reluctant to participate in research, so there is a lack of information on how mental health and wellness issues affect African American elders. This project gives the CIP community an important opportunity to contribute to knowledge about aging and

Voucher programs offer fresh produce to seniors and mothers

Each summer, the Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program provides vouchers redeemable for fresh fruits, vegetables and herbs to senior citizens at approved local farmers markets, roadside stands and community-supported agriculture programs.
The program provides low-income seniors with four vouchers, totaling \$20, which they can exchange for Pennsylvania-grown produce. To qualify for the program, individuals must be 60 or older by December 31, 2011, with a total household income before taxes of less than \$20,147 for a single person and \$27,214 for a couple, based on 2010 income. Proof of age and residency is required. To find out what senior centers are providing vouchers across the city, contact the PCA help line at 215-765-9040. The vouchers will be made available at the

from 2pm to 4pm Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays starting July 11th until they run out.

9. Don't turn on lights at all for as long as you can — open your curtains and enjoy natural light.

10. Drive the speed limit, and combine all your errands for the week in one trip.

19. Subscribe to good eco-friendly blogs. My favorites are <u>The Daily</u> <u>Green, TreeHugger</u>, and <u>Keeper of the Home</u>. Of course, you gotta subscribe to <u>Simple Organic</u>.

20. Before buying anything new, first check your local <u>Craigslist</u> or <u>Freecycle</u>.

21. Support local restaurants that use food derived less than 100 miles away, and learn more about <u>the benefits of eating locally</u>.

22. Fix leaky faucets.

23. Make your own household cleaners. I've got quite a few recipes in my e-book.

24. Line dry your laundry.

25. Watch <u>*The Story of Stuff*</u> with your kids, and talk about the impact your household trash has on our landfills.

26. <u>Learn with your kids about another country or culture</u>, expanding your knowledge to other sides of the world.

28. Lower the temperature on your hot water heater.

29. Unplug unused chargers and appliances.

30. Repurpose something – <u>turn one of your well-worn t-shirts into</u> <u>basic play pants</u> for your baby. Or save egg cartons for paint wells, seed
